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# 9 Artists to Check Out at the 2016 Afropunk Festival

Conceived as a continuation of the scenes documented in the 2003 cult film, Afropunk, the first Afropunk Festival took place in Brooklyn in 2005. In its early years, the festival provided a politicized music and community-building space where black rock, punk, and heavy metal artists who often found difficulty landing gigs could perform. But as the festival has grown over the years (including a touring festival, showcases in Washington DC, Atlanta, and Chicago, and most recently, one-day festivals in Paris and London) its community-building initiatives have expanded, but the overriding philosophy has begun to weaken

Until last year, the festival was free to the public, which allowed festival-goers to see headliners that, in other instances, they would have to shell out a pretty penny for. While it's safe to assume that mainstream headliners like Janelle Monae and D'Angelo guarantee a more culturally-diverse audience, satisfying the numbers that corporate sponsors need to see in order to continue funding, they stray from what the Festival was originally meant to highlight; alternative black musical artists and communities who choose lifestyles that differ from the mainstream black-centric tropes that often hinder individuality and innovation.

Now to be fair, any festival that expands over time will eventually have to re-negotiate its original purpose. The factors that make an event unique will always change to suit the social and economic climate. But despite the complaints about Afropunk morphing into a slightly more tanned Coachella, there have always been hidden gems during the two-day lineup, and this year is no different; most often, the smaller acts end up being some of the most impressive and authentic bands on the bill. Here are some of the artists performing at this year's Brooklyn Afropunk we think are absolutely crucial.

SATE, formerly known as Saidah Baba Talibah, has been described as a modern-day Betty Davis (the legendary 70's funk soulstress). # JOHN MAYALL: Talk About That

# Sate received seven out of seven



Our prejudices and our natural tendency to classification often mislead us. A black woman on the microphone, it can only be for r'n'b, soul, jazz, blues. Yet, Tina Turner, Skin (Skunk Anansie) or Lisa Kekaula (BellRays) have already proved to us that they knew damn rocker. So do not make the same mistake by seeing the cover of this very successful first album of Sate, "RedBlack & Blue" (yes, everything hooked), actually a best of three already released EP, packed in just over 38 minutes . Yes, the young woman who illustrates it is of African origin but, look good, it looks like it shouts a good blow, it gives you a good idea of what to expect ...

In fact, "Warrior", the first song, is a fabulous entry: super-voice, super riff, we barely imagine what it can give on stage, if everything was like this, the BellRays would have some serious worries To be done! As a result, after such an entry into matter, the rest can only be less agitated. This is the case, even if the compositions are all very interesting, and sometimes heavy enough, like this "Mama talk to me" that gets you in the head under a real battery hammer-drumstick, or the evil name "Silence".

The rest is a more traditional rock-blues, but literally transcended by the voice of Sate (which rhymes with "fate", says the interested). Or the power ballad, like the pretty "The answer". Or even 70s welcome influences, as on this strange "Feel", with the surprising bridge 70s in the middle, which makes its small effect.



But in fact, who is it, Sate? The young woman does not come out completely out of nowhere. Canadian, daughter of the blues singer Salomey Bey, she already has a career behind her, in another musical style, under her real name, Saidah Baba Talibah. I also suspect it to be that S. Matthews who co-signs all the songs. In any case, she has a voice, and does not deprive to demonstrate her talent.

A very nice surprise that this first album. We wait firmly to see what it gives live, the recent French tour of the clubs having unfortunately avoided the capital, but could only be part handed over ...

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# SATE / RED BLACK & BLUE



Sate is a mix of *Tina Turner* for the power of the voice, from *Skunk Anansie* to energetic rock. This Canadian release her debut album **Red Black & Blue**, a mix of these first three EPs and a blend of rock and blues energetic.

Sate, whose real name is Saldah Baba Talibah, is a Canadian singer and the daughter of the blues singer Salomey Bey (Canadian blues band Andy and the Bey Sisters). She has released three EPs (an album with only 4-5 titles usually to make her name), referring to the three women in her life: her mother (represented by a red throat), her daughter (represented by a black panther) Sister (represented by the blue morpheu butterfly).

We feel the strength of this woman in her music and it comes very probably from her mother who has been fighting Alzheimer's since 2011. She also pays 10% of this income to the Alzheimer Society in Canada.

Well, quite bored; The album now

An album full of energy as Warrior proves . A crazy energy, very hard rock. A fast paced drum rhythm, power and energy in the voice.

This energy appears even in the texts. The pride of his name given by his mother, giving her that warlike energy, that fire she exploits on stage and in her music.

You probably understand better why I gave the references of  $\it Tina\ Turner$  and  $\it Skunk\ Anansie\ previously$  with this piece.

I have a huge crush on  $What \, Did \, I \, Do$ . The intro to the bass, very nocturnal, melancholic, slow, is just superb.  ${\bf Sate's}$  slower voice blends perfectly with this intro, like a petition.

Then the song accelerates with the arrival of the battery which unrolls a phrasing (a rhythm) very punchy. The piece is growing in power little by little. We have a mixture of light blues and a big dose of rock, and one thing is certain; this piece sends grave!



Know My Name switches to a darker piece. An always very blues / rock song with this energy fueled by the very powerful electric guitar, swinging some sharp notes and always that voice that gives the impression that it can still give more.

The Answer is a very nice ballad. A cry of love for his sick mother (I think) with a sweetness and at the same time a crazy energy. A superb melody, with this guitar solo and this a little dirty sound that makes me raise the hair on my arms. Sate installs her voice, a black Adele on this piece. This is my second favorite on this album.

# Conclusion :

A superb first album with rock energy and the percussive voice of a talented singer. It is no longer a slap but a first in the mouth that one receives so much power. There are less good songs (Feel and Silence did, I think, drop a little the energy of the album and I hang less on the melodies). But overall, it's a very good first album and we can judge of all the vocal power of Sate on the last piece, Peace, which is just awesome even if short.

To listen if we need a revival of vitamins and energy or if instead we want to leave a day of work too busy and full of shit (it happens, must not mess, everything is not pink in the job).

Sate is a breath of fresh air made in 2016. It is the Black Panther of the rock n roll, the one who would have saved the season 2 of Vinyl if Richie Finestra had discovered it 40 years ago.

If John Lennon is not the most relevant example of respect for women's rights, these two lines from his album Sometime In New York City have an impact in all circles, including musical. These strong babes, who give us the thrill of every vocalise, and who give the impression of fighting as if their life depended on each concert, that exists only too little. 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

After the "Warrior" ("you will know my name, from the Mississippi to the Nile"!), Sort of scud punk-funk, and foaming it "What Did I Do", "Live On Your Love". 

When you discover new artists, there are sometimes good surprises and favorites, Sate is one of them! When listening to the record, the first thing that strikes is the energy and the feeling that comes from it. "Warrior" sets the tone of the album, drums and guitar fuzz and a blues singer who wants to do battle, it sounds like a meeting between Black Sabbath and Tina Turner! "Live

On Your Love" is a reminder of the Beatles' "Come Together" with a catchy and funky refrain. On "Know My Name", Sate sings as if his life depended on it and the tortured guitar reinforces the heaviness of the atmosphere. The ballad "The Answer" allows the singer to give all the fullness of her voice and the melody forces emotion. The album closes with "Peace", it is a pure marvel, singing on the back of Hammond organ and which rises in power, the voice takes you to the guts to stop brutally. Hardly finished, we feel an immediate lack of that energy that carries the album and transcends it!

SATE's debut album begins with the song 'Warrior' features lead female vocals bellowing the words 'you're gonna know my name!" into the microphone accompanied by righteous guitar riffs and full drum kit solos. The album, RedBlack&Blue is more of a war cry or a call to arms than anything else. This is about as rock gets to metal without donning chain-mail and face paint. It is truly SATE's wavering and sultry vocals that save the group from crossing over this boundary. She seems to channel the likes of Jimi Hendrix in her delivery, showcasing a tremendous and confident boundless range. But don't get me wrong, SATE is in nobody's shadow, and in fact, as seen in the first song, she is determined to make a name for herself one way or another. Nevertheless, Toronto native SATE's impassioned musical presence garnered her album the epithet of most anticipated release of the year in her home city. SATE's name is derived from the definition of something being desired or quenched in full. This comes through in each and every one of the ten tracks on the album, each one more primal and carnal than the last.


SATE's style harkens back to rock and rolls heyday, her vocals adding a modern twist to complex lyrical schemes. My favorite track off the release is 'Live on Your Love' on which she sings, 'when push comes to shove I could live on your love." This song rocks out as harder as the others, but I found the lyrical theme to be most classically within the genre, which I appreciated given the general decline of this style within the industry.



I also very much enjoyed the track 'Mama Talk to Me', as her vocals are altered in a way that gives them a boxy, pleasing sound reminiscent of the Black Keys.



On the other end of the spectrum, the track 'The Answer' is much softer in comparison to the other tracks, though still replete with the expected power of blues-rock.



This is exactly the opposite of easy-listening music. This is the music of locker rooms before a championship game, blasting in the headphones of a jackhammer operator on a noisy city street, the soundtrack to an episode of Sons of Anarchy. SATE's music is not for the faint of heart, and there is certainly a time and place for it to be throbbing through your bones. SATE is rock and rolls past, present, and perhaps even its future.

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# Review - SATE

Dear Danko Jones

Good day sir! How is life on the rock and roll island I am sure you are rule as dictator? Did the Smugglers' ever repay you for your pants, or just pay tribute to them in song?

I am writing to tell you about the discovery of your female musical counterpoint. I am confident she is actually the female version of you from an alternate universe and, somehow, the two of you are existing in the same physical plane. Her name is **SATE** and her new album, *RedBlack&Blue*, is a massive hard-hitting rock, blues, jazz, soul, Afropunk influenced album with as much bravado as....well... a Danko Jones album. Allow me to explain.

The opening track "Warrior" kicks off with a high energy, gritty, riff rock anthem complete with powerhouse lead vocals, falsetto sing along background vocals, heavy guitars, crazy drum-fills, huge bass sound, effected vocal percussion and an explicit deleted vocabulary for extra attitude. Every instrument on this track (and yes, the voice is an instrument) locks in like a jet fighter laser targeting system to demolish anything in its wase. During the emerging rock and roll destruction, each player has a chance to shine with fills and riffs and big-produced madness. "Warrior" shoots your plane out of the air only allowing you to catch your breath as you parachute down before the next song starts.

"What Did I Do" starts off with moody, solo blues guitar and a hugely soulful vocal line, with expression to take down any lazz purist, opening up into a driving Death meets the Headstones playing in a blues club evoking Robert Johnson and the "woke up this morning" line of any classic blues tune. The chorus grooves out into a solid, sing along rock melody complete with a Big Sugar "Drive Like Hell" guitar riff. Soaring soul and blues influenced vocals propel the driving force of tight guitars and splashing cymbals.

The vibe of intimidating vocals, standoffish guitars, fuzzed-fat bass, and rumble-tough drums continues through "Live on The vine of intiminating vocals, standormen guitars, fuzzeer-at bass, and rumble-tough drums continues through Live Your Love, "Know My Name," Talk to Me" and "Selinece" displaying the consistency of style and differing creative choice; the sound is established but not repetitive. "Know My Name" has an opening iff that would Montreal's classic Deja Voodoo proud. Elements of Living Colour shine through in musical grit and technical solidness. Lyrically there is angst, anguish, attitude and a self-assured confidence of facing, struggling and defeating life's attacks. "Silence" is a great mix of punk angst and pop delivery with a unison lick that should be on the next edition of Rock Band.

"The Answer" is the album's first foray into a ballad, an emotional, understated opening with vocals and piano. The slow jam remains, but the pace changes with intensifying instrumental parts and a big, rock sound. The arrangement of "The Answer" builds as each section layers on top of the last, building intensity and emotional appeal. "Try" continues the slow tempo format but with a greater rock feel and a slight 1950s style; imagine if Aretha Franklin was fronting a 90s hard rock band playing a Shangri-Las cover.

"Feel" has the one of the best use of finger snaps and hand claps ever on any album. Tough groove, yes. Rhythmic vocals, yes. Best hand claps and snaps ever, yes. Tina Turner fronting later years Bad Brains all over this track.

A whirting Leslle speaker opens the closing track "Peace" with a gospel delivered "Peace hear me / Peace feel me / Give peace to all the ones I love" transitioning into a dramatic, half time ending. The lyrics become a mantra, pleading for peace's guidance and delivery. A powerful closer for a massive album.

Listening to the record, Danko, I think I have devised the perfect super group for you to develop combining your musical elements and SATE's musical elements to produce the biggest sounding collaborative band since Alpha Flight, if Alpha Flight was a band, that is.

Here's the line-up: SATE (lead vocals), Danko Jones (vocals and guitar), Big Sugar's Gordie Johnson (bass and vocals) blues rock extraordinaire Megan Lane (guitars and vocals), the Belladonnas and the Temps' punk noir vocalist Zeida Belladonna (guitar and vocals) and Age of Electric's Kurt Dahle (drums). This combination would create the biggest vocal and guitar sound imaginable. Each one of you would bring your own reminiscent take on your respective genre sounds. Get on it, sir, it would be brilliant!

Oh, and have Hawksley Workman produce the album with guest appearances by K'Naan and / or Classified.

If you are in the Toronto area, her release album show is June  $16^{th}$  at the Bovine Sex Club. Check this vocal force of nature out for yourself and prepare for an amazing show!



When SATE and her band strode into studio 211 they brought the rock with them. There was a palpable energy in the air as the band rolled in their instruments and unpacked their gear. Kirt Godwin, the guitarist, started ripping blistering solos to warm his fingers, as Wade O Brown, the keyboardist, eyed the studio Hammond organ — that we promptly added to his mix.

The sound check was very loud, with Tony Rabalao pounding the drums and Justin deGraaf thumbing the bass. SATE ran her band through a few songs and just as quickly as she'd appeared, she returned to the green room to save her voice for the show.

If you haven't seen SATE before, these videos will convince you to catch her next show. And you'll understand why SATE was resting her voice before the performance: she played the most energetic, bombastic, entertaining show we've had in studio 211 in the past year. Her voice soars, growls and caresses as she works her way through blues, rock, funk and even a "jazz" tune. SATE doesn't just dance, she prowls, she struts, she seduces. With the band laying down the heavy grooves, you can hear why her list of influences includes Tina Turner and Black Sabbath.

As her bio states, "SATE knows your desires and she is prepared to give you more than you can handle. SATE [definition]: satisfy a desire to the full."

Chart Attack: Why did you decide to release this the way you did, as 3 EPs through PledgeMusic?

SATE: I think it's a really great way to connect with fans and to create a unique experience, to bring people on my journey.

Your pledgers helped determine the track listing of your album. You interact with and give your fans a lot. Is that level of stimulation exhausting?

Yeah, but it's important because without the people listening to my music and coming out to shows I don't have anyone to play for. (laughs)

What's the toughest thing about generating or keeping interest as an artist without a major label behind you?

I think interaction with my fans, my warriors, because I don't have that machine to keep my image going. If I don't do it, nobody else will.

# Why do you call your fans warriors?

It came out of the song "Worrior." It's a call to action for people to find their joy and their passion. It's me trying to empower people to go to the ends of the earth to be happy and passionate in their life. It fell out of the sky to me, the idea of getting people to be warriors, to be passionate about whatever they do — be it a data analyst, a dancer, whatever.



# Is it true your mother, Salome Bey, didn't let you sing as a kid?

She let me sing, but she never pushed me to be on stage more than any other stage mom, momager would do. She was doing her thing, I was watching her, but I always wanted to be up there, always bugging her.

Did she play a big part in your development or was music something you've grown into yourself?

She pushed me to be good, in a way that said "you're not getting on stage with the half-assed shit" but she never pushed me to go into the business. It made me want



I don't think it's a subconscious effort to not follow in my mom's footsteps. My mom sang all kinds of music, and what I learned from her was to be raw and passionate on stage. I do emulate her in that way; it just sounds different.

What does your mother think of your music and your evolution as an artist ove the years?


Not a lot anymore. My album has to do with dealing with my mom's dementia [a portion of the PledgeMusic funds went to the Alzheimer Society of Canada], and dealing with the transition from being her daughter to becoming more mothering.

Your earlier music under your own name sometimes showed a very different side of you compared to what we hear on RedBlack&Blue. What made you change?

I would say live shows made me change, made me ground myself and evolve into SATE. The tender, vulnerable R&B/soul stuff -1 can do it, but it's not what fuels ...

# How did this new identity of SATE come about?

Through making this album. I let go and realized a lot about myself in writing this album. It came from my past. Performing more on stage made me realize there was another part of me that I wanted to name: SATE.



It's a really cliche question, but what is the significance of the name "SATE".

SATE - well, it means "to satisfy." And there's so many ways to find satisfaction in life, and to use that name, to choose that name, is a great thing. To just constantly be called and reminded to satisfy myself, and satisfy others. It's a service thing, it's a reciprocal thing.

WHAT DO YOU WANT THAT TO MEAN TO YOUR AUDIENCE?

Well, I want them to be sated [Laughs] It's, again, cliche: I want them to be sated, I want them to feel a sense of connection to me as well, connection to the music. A connection to life, connection to joy and passion and all of that stuff.

IN YOUR BIO ON FACEBOOK, IT SAYS "SATE IS OUT TO SATISFY AND EMPOWER A NATION." WHAT DOES THAT MEAN TO YOU?

I really spend a lot of time demanding things from the crowd, demanding things from my "warriors," as I call them. But first and foremost, what I demand of people is to have by and passion in their life - to really do the things that they love to do, and do it with vigor, with enthusiasm. And so I think that's where I really focus on the empowerment, of your self-worth, of yourself. That's how I set out to empower a nation.

WHO ARE THE MUSICAL INFLUENCES THAT INSPIRED YOU TO CREATE YOUR UNIQUE

Personally? I would say my mother, first of all, first and foremost. In Canada, where I'm from, from Toronto. ... My mom is from Newark, New Jersey, actually, so I spend a lot of time down here. But both of my parents were very musically eclectic. My mom was a singer, and in Canada she was touded as the "First Lady of blues and jazz."

But I have my uncle and my aunt, and my cousins. And then it spills out into people like Black Sabbath. Reigmord is one person that I adore. Adore Reigmord I There's Betty Davis as well. Chalak Khan, Tina Tumer, Big Mama Thomton. You know, there's a lot of blues stuff that I listen to that inspires me. Led Zeppelin, and The Beatles, and ... it spans a lot. But through it all, like, the edge and the passion is all what I gravitate towards.

HOW DID YOU BRING THE BAND FOR THIS RECORD TOGETHER, AND WHAT YOU WERE LOOKING FOR PEOPLE TO BRING TO IT?

The same: edge, passion and soul. Just give it, balls-to-the-wall. I chose a lot of session musicans in Toronto, and we just kind of went in and just threw it, and gave it as much as we could. I was really, really, really happy with the result. It was \_ It made me cry sometimes, it made me just want to kick a wall most times, just \_ In my happiness, you know? [Laughs]

YOU SUCCESSFULLY FUNDED THIS PROJECT ON PLEDGEMUSIC. HOW DO YOU THINK TOOLS LIKE THIS ARE CHANGING THE WAY ARTISTS CAN ENTER AND WORK WITHIN THE INDUSTRY?

It builds your community. You can go out and touch your small nucleus, your small community. But because you're on the internet, things just go wherever they go. You don't have control over it - that's a good and bad thing. But the good thing is, they go wherever they go. So I've got people pledging in Africa, in Australia, in Germany, in the States, in Canada. And there are places where I haven't been, where people are connecting to me I mean, you're going to pay for a CD, you're going to pay for a concert. So why not, like, be a part of the process, be a part of the journey? And I think that's so exciting.

AFTER SURPASSING YOUR FUNDRAISING GOAL, YOU NOTED THAT YOU WOULD DONATE SOME OF THE ADDITIONAL PROCEEDS TO AN ALZHEIMER'S FOUNDATION. WHY WAS THAT MEANINGFUL FOR YOU?

My mother is dealing with Dementia, so that's definitely something that's very close to my heart, especially since, as I said, she's.... I mean, she's my mother, for goodness' sakel But, you know, being a singer and a communicator, there were a lot of times when it was tough. So anything that I can give to make things better, to donate to research or whatever. I'm going to do it.

AND HAVING SURPASSED THAT GOAL AND WITH THIS ALBUM READY TO COME OUT, WHAT DOES SUCCESS LOOK LIKE OR MEAN FOR YOU NOW?

World domination is next! [Laughs] I just want to get out and front of people and perform this shit, you know? It's great to have that calling card for people to be able to take home, but I want to be out, live, in front of people and feeling energy, and just giving off. I'm out to empower a nation, you know, satisfy and empower a nation. I can't do that if I'm home, Success for me is to continue doing what I'm doing, to travel the world and continue connecting with other souls.

WHAT ARE YOU LOOKING FORWARD TO THE MOST ABOUT PERFORMING AT

Well, AfroPunk for me is a community. It's a community that is alternative thinkers, alternative listeners in the black community, which is great. There's so much focus on certain types of music that fit into a certain box, and I don't fit into that box. So to be playing AfroPunk is great, because 'I'll find my tribe, I think I'm looking forward to it, I've been once. But I'm looking forward to playing it, stage diving.

I'VE SEEN IT DONE. WHEN I SAW FISHBONE (ALSO PLAYING AFROPUNK FESTIVAL), THAT WAS ALL THEY DID.

Oh, yeah. Weal. Well, they're notorious. I'm actually looking forward to playing with them again. I played with them in Toronto, and they're a huge influence, for me. Fishbone and Living Colour.... They're huge influences for me. They're actually ... Aside from my family and my mother, they're the reason why I wanted to do this the way I do it.

WHAT WAS IT ABOUT THEM THAT INSPIRED YOU?

They're black and alternative. They were doing something that was edgy and passionate, and I was like. "What is this?" They speak to the \_\_I guess, my cultural \_\_What I grew up with, culturally. There's just \_\_ It just spoke to me. So I was so happy that they existed, and i'm so happy to be playing with them.

ARE THERE ANY OTHER CURRENT OR UP-AND-COMING BANDS THAT YOU KIND OF ROOT FOR?

I don't know if we're playing together, but i'm looking forward to seeing Benjamin Booker again. Good morning. This is your wake-up call. Toronto-based singer and songwriter
SATE is here to launch you into throbbing, ferocious rock 'n' roll. Forget that
her mother Salome Bey is known as Canada's First Lady of Blues. Forget that
her uncle Andy Bey is a sensitive song stylist, adored by jazz afficientacies. Her
closest musical kin are Living Colour and Fishbone. There's a reason why
she's performing on AFROPUNK's Girrf Riot at Lincoln Center Out of
Doors. She cannot be contained.

SATE: My lineage, my ancestry. I come from a long line of fire starters. I push myself to take risks, to put myself in challenging or uncomfortable situations.

SATE: Everything I We constantly have to listen and look at what's going on around us. There's a song on my album called "Feel." It's about ignoring my intuition, which is personfied as a parther that's beating me up. You need to listen to your gut for signs that let! you where to go and what to do and how to be. If you don't listen, you don't grow.



SATE: Bluesy, raunchy soul meets dirty rock 'n' roll. Sometimes I call it punk funk. There's a punk attitude to it. The foundation is the blues. The foundation of all rock 'n' roll is blues.

SATE: My mode you must mais solurize.

SATE: My modern was very influential in my life. She sang jazz and acted in plays about the blues women. They took no prisoners. That attitude was passed down though the generations to rock 'n' roll, to metal, to punk. When I was a teenager, theard that passion in Fishbone, Living Colour, and Soundgarden. I decided that's how I wanted to express myself. When I first saw Fishbone at Toronto's Masonic Temple, I lost my mind. There was swest on the walls. I thought, "That's how you do a show. Everything should be recention."

P: The Black Rock Coalition was founded in the 1980s by Living Colour's Vernon Reid among others to help reclaim rock music as the cultural product of African Americans. Do we still need to assert that black people can rock?

SATE: Absolutely. When I first saw Fishbone, the Red Hot Chill Peppers were opening up for them. And you see what happened. Can you name a black rocker inght now? It's still a fight to prove that we belong. We're not making race records anymore so to speak. In the "60s, there was a big separation between white and black artists. Big Mama Thornton sang "Hound Dog." but it wasn't on mainstream radio because she was a black woman and Evils Pready op the hit. Today, we're not separate, but we're still packaged differently.

LP: Tell me about the new album. Resiliant-Ribum.

LP: Tell me about the new album, RedBlack&Blue.

SATE: It was created from three EPs: one called *Bed*; one called *Blaci*; and one called *Blaci*. Those are the colors of my three totem animals—the robin, the panther, and the butterfly—spirit guides on a journey to understanding my relationships with my mother, my daughter, and my sister. My fans—I call them the Warriors—chose the tracks for the album.

LP: I understand that your mother is suffering from dementia.

SATE: She started having epileptic seizures in her fifties and it developed into dementia. That journey with my nother has been so challenging because my mother is a singer, my mother is a communicator, my mother is my mother. To watch someone who was all of that deteriorate and, for long periods of time, not utfer a word was very hard. There's a song on the album celled "Mama Talk to Me." The lyrics are "Know those secrets that you hold, are poisoning our souls. Mama talk to me, talk to me. Let it all just talk to me, feed me I need you to talk to me."

LC: The songs from the album are powerful. And your band seems fearless diving into them.

SATE: They're my boys: guitarist Kirt Godwin, bassist Alex St. Kitts, keyboardist Wade O. Brown, and drummer Tony Rabatao. They're incredible. They pash me to be full of fire because they bring fire. They have a lot of fun on stage. It gets exweary. It gets messy. It love it. To be a woman and or command a stage standing in front of a bunch of dudes is power —on all frequencies.

# How do you think being from Toronto that has aided in shaping who you are and how you live your life?

Well, growing up in Toronto, it's really very diverse. Apparently it's the most diverse city in the world. It's food and music and language-having access to all those things and really just being immersed in a lot off. Having the freedom to really sit bock and listen, and feel how that shifts you, how that changes you, how that affects you. I think that's Toronto.

# There's a stereotype that all people from Canada are really, really nice. Do you think that's true?

People are polite in Canada. There are lots of undercurrents of bullshit that are not very nice. There is a lot of passive aggressive shit that goes on. I guess that's what makes people very nice.

People say that people in New York are as sholes. But-quite frankly-when I go to New York, I have the best time and people are really nice. It's real. I've never actually come across anyone in New York that init nice and real. There's a lot of second guessing as metimes, I agree with that sentiment. But, that's all over the world.

## We know that you have a pretty extensive musical background. Was there a moment that you realised it was what you wanted to pursue?

## What's your favorite part about performing live?

### You just got back from tour in mid-May. Any crasy stories?

YES! Yeah, a lot of them. There are a lot of crazy stories, but one of the things that happened was we kept coming across the word-or the spirit of-the wolf. We played a place in Montreal that was called <u>le long Garou</u>, which is "The Werewolf" in French. The next day, we stayed on Wolf Road. When we played New York, our sound guy's name was Wolf. Where we parked our car was right in front of a place called that had "wolf" in its name. The last place we played in Cleveland, the owner of the bar had just lost her dog and it was half wolf. It was a little crazy.

We looked into it. It means "listening to your intuition" and sometimes going solo.

## What made you choose to do a PledgeMusic campaign with your latest work?

I felt that <u>PledgeMusic</u> was the best vehicle because they focus on music. They're really hands on I just liked the model. I like the interactions. Every outlet [like IndiaCoGo] is great, but I really like Pledge because it's just all about music. They're fucking warriors, too. They're amazing.

No, no! Not nervous at all, actually. It was something I brainstormed with the Pledge guys and I thought it was an incredible idea. Why not? It makes so much sense. If I'm going to put the music out there to people that are believing in me by giving to my campaign, why would I then not ask them what their opinion is as to how we shape and form this? I wanted to put my best foot forward so that they'd be happy with it and they'd champion it just as much as I have. I put out all the music that I loved. So it was just a matter of narrowing it down.

I feel like I'm more of a winner because I had their input.

I hope that they feel something. I hope that they see that not much has changed. We have a lot of work to do. I am so looking forward to playing with <u>Fishbone</u> and <u>Living Color</u> again. Or just being there to watch them. I'm also looking forward to this super jam made up of members from each band. That's inspiration for what I do. It's black people in rock, and it's rad.


# Who is your favorite superhero, and why?

# SATE'S "FEEL" LEADS US IN TO HER SOULFUL, ROCK 'N ROLL REBIRTH

ATE's soulful voice is not new to the music scene. Raised in a very musical family, the matriarch of which is none other than Miss Salome Bey. (Yup. That's right! New Jersey native-and Canada's First Lady of Blues-Salome Bey is SATE's mother!) She grew up learning the soul, jazz, and gospel vocal stylings of her mother (among many other performers), and has even joined her on stage at Toronto's storied Massey Hall (where she has played solo many times as well).

SATE (defined as "satisfy a desire to the fullest") is her reincarnation, and her new project began with three individual EPs, created with a successful PledgeMusic campaign and aptly titled Red, Black & Blue. Each EP is "a journey into the multitude of emotions dealing with the three most important ladies" in her life, work that was initially released digitally. Donors to the original PledgeMusic campaign were to vote on which songs they wanted to see on the full-length album when it released, and have been compiled into the 10-track album RedBlack&Blue.

SATE's live performances have been highly praised by NOWMagazine and Lithium, and her energy is palpable in every video we've caught a glimpse of. How lucky are we, then, to have the pleasure of exclusively premiering her new music video for "Feel"?



At first listen, we heard a little bit of that Lenny Kravitz-inspired greatness that we all know and love. But there is no doubt that this new sound is punk-inspired, and comes straight from SATE's heart. Her attitude is discernible as she croons the first line, "Woke up earlier than usual, I was ready to take on the day." The video itself is a compilation of civil rights imagery, and continues the open discussion on race in today's society. It also begs the questions, "What do you want me to hear? What do you want me to see?" as if her emotions are being controlled-or at least triggered-by outside sources. "Feel" allows its watchers to further question control that the media has, and feeds into the probing discussion on race in our culture.

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# SATE REDBLACK AND BLUE



If you are looking for a in your face attitude Rock/ Alternative album then you have to look no further than Sate, Red Black and Blue. Red Black and Blue is a such wide variety of styles and sounds. Sate really touches on quite a few different genres throughout the album, although Blues seems to be the dominant sound that you can catch a glimpse of in each song. Rock with a bit of R&B with soul is also quite noticeable throughout the album as well.

The album starts off with one hell of a start with the single "Warrior". I'm pretty sure Sate gets her point across in the opening moments in the song. Quickly your ears are met with the attitude and ferocity that is Sate, (You really need to see Sate live to experience the full blast and amplification). The song touches on many different styles and genres that makes it quite difficult to call out and name a specific genre. If I had to choose something the closest I could come up with is Alternative Rock and Blues. But with the backing vocals and keys you also get a touch of the Blues, R&B and Soul as well. The lead guitar work is something else that you should pay attention to throughout "Warrior" as well.

"Live On You Love" is an alternative Blues track. The grittier guitar work and sound blends with Sate's vocals quite nicely. The rhythm throughout the track is a quite nice flow. The timing within the song especially lead and backing vocals is quite a nice touch to the song.

Up next is a track titled "Know My Name". I can go out on a limb here and call this track a distant cousin of "Warrior", although the track is down in tempo compared. The lead and backing vocals are again an attraction in the song. The lead guitar work throughout the track is quite noticeable for me. A bit of a downside to the guitar work is the fact that it is layered in there quite a bit in a few spots, but in other spots especially near the ending of the track the guitar work stands right out.

The Intro for "Mama Talk To Me" jumps right out at you the second it hit. I know that it made me jump in my seat a little the first time I heard it on the album. Sate's vocals feed right off of the guitar in this track. Or it may be the opposite way with my guess but I would still put my money on Sate feeding off of the guitar.

That should come as no surprise, as SATE is the daughter of Canadian blues and jazz pioneer Salome Bey, and she learned at the feet of countless music legends that passed through Toronto during her childhood. She soon found her own voice by adding the sounds and attitudes of punk and hard rock that shaped her own identity and set her upon her journey.

The release of RedBlack&Bluenow marks the moment when SATE officially picks up that torch, and gives Canadian rock the shot in the arm it desperately needs.

# What sets RedBlack&Blue apart from anything you've previously done?

It's a concept album, it's a personal album and it totally encompasses all that I am and what I do onstage. Songs like "Warrior," "Mama Talk To Me," "Know My Name," "Feel," and "What Did I Do," they all express the messages I wanted to get out there about me and what I believe in.

# What do you recall about your first time performing in public?

Not much, I was six years old. It was at Massey Hall and I was singing a solo in one of my mother's songs called "Have I Thanked You God."

# What has been your most memorable experience while touring in Canada?

Playing an awesome house party in Winnipeg, It was my first time crowd surfing and it happened in this guy's kitchen, of all places.

# What song by another artist do you wish you had written?

"A Song For You" by Leon Russell. Hove Donny Hathaway's version—it breaks my heart every single time I hear him sing it. The song itself is so heart-wrenchingly raw and honest.

# If there were anything you'd change about the music industry, what would it be?

Off the top of my head, I'd wish for more risk takers. I just feel that there's enough bullshit that sounds the same on the radio, and people that look the same in the media. Major corporations back the same old shit and don't go out on a limb.

Raucous and rowdy local rock 'n' roller **SATE**, formerly known as Saidah Baba Talibah, has had this debut full-length on the way for quite a while now. Three separately released digital EPs were the result of a successful PledgeMusic campaign, in which SATE turned to fans to vote for their favourite tunes to build RedBlack&Blue's track list. It's always a risk to put decisions in the hands of fans, but SATE's dedication to hers, and her fan base's to her, pays off on this collection of swaggering blues rock.

Her calling card is opening track Warrior, and for good reason: it's hot as a muscle car roaring fast down a desert highway, with a roller-coaster hook and rock 'n' soul breakdown. It's also a perfect opening statement: "You're gonna know my name / from the Mississippi to the Rhine." But follow-up What Did I Do packs less of a punch, due to a slow start and some overwrought vocal runs. Similarly, Live On Your Love gets a bit too cheesy with lines like "I would suck on the bone / leave no piece of you alone."

When SATE ditches the rock clichés, the tunes are nuanced and sharp. Mama Talk To Me is surprisingly poignant beneath its bar-rock stomp (SATE's mother, singer Salome Bey, retired from performing in 2011 because of dementia). Piano-driven The Answer gives her big pipes room to breathe, and closer Peace similarly highlights her powerful vocals over organ, buzzing synth and a choir.

Silence, meanwhile, is a perfect storm of muscled-up guitar riffs, blazing, infectious choruses and an explosive din of a finale - the kind of song that'll make people remember the name SATE.

# SATE "RedBlack&Blue" Review

SATE released her debut album RedBlack&Blue after busting out some really intense singles. The album is not only loud, but it is independent, energetic, and full of rock and roll with a blue blend. The album is comprised of her ten best tracks, the songs which really exhibit what SATE is all about – huge statements and proud intensity.

It is inarguable that SATE is not only a talented musician who makes great tunes. her objective vocal ability is unlike many in her genre and in contemporary music. The range works extremely well with the wide array of sounds of the pounding guitar melodies and swaggering beats. 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# Gimme Your Answers: An Interview w/ SATE



SATE is a soulful, dirty rock and roll, dance-hit making artist from Toronto on a mis and empower a nation". Ahead of her show at The Horseshoe Tavern in Toronto, AMBY met up with SATE to discuss empowerment, liking messages, and totem animals. Learn more in the exclusive interview below

AMBY: Hey SATE, thanks for speaking with us today. Please introduce yourself to our readers

SATE: My name is SATE.

AMBY: We're really enjoying your track Warrior. What inspired the song? What's the story behind

SATE: I wanted something to dance to. I'm all about empowerment and really just I think we kinda live in a world where there's so much getting us down. There's so much sadness in the news and there are people around doing things that they don't want to do -that aren't making them happy. So that's really what Warrior is about: awakening that fire, that spirit that supports you doing whatever the fuck you want that makes you happy.

AMBY: What was it like recording the Red, Black and Blue EPs?

SATE: Pretty fucking incredible flaughs). It's always about getting the music that's out of yourself and putting it on musicians and hearing it come to life is emotional, you know? Just having a group of really badass players just play the shit out of it and really give the love that you want inspires me to sing and to put everything that I've ever wished for onto each of the songs. So it was an incredible experience.

AMBY: Can you explain how each of the EPs relate with your "totem animals"?

SATE: So, I would never want to encroach or appropriate anything but there are animals that follow me and guide me that pop up all the time. Totem animals or "spirit animals" you could call them. The Red Robin is the first one. I love spring time, it makes me happy when the snow is gone [laughs]. The Black Panther and the Blue Butterfly. All of them are really about transformation and coming out and shedding old and becoming new. Like springtime for the Robin and for the Panther it's all about embracing the night and darkness and rebirth. And of course the Butterfly is all about transformation. We're always transforming, I'm always transforming but it was a huge time of transformation for me and just shedding old and just coming into what I feel is my new phase of life.

AMBY: I thought it was a really interesting idea to allow the fans who are "pledging" for the Red. Black and Blue EP's to vote for their favourite songs to be on your new album. Where did that idea come from?

SATE: I want to claim it as my own [laughs]. I mean you have conversations and throw shit out but I think the whole crowd funding thing is in and itself a way to interact with your fans and I figured since they're here, why not ask them which ones they like the best. They're my sounding board, it just made sense to me.

AMBY: You're now playing a show here in Toronto tonight which we cannot wait to cover. Which songs are your favourite to perform in a live setting?

SATE: All of them! [laughs] My encore song I'm really hoping to perform, it's a cover song.

AMBY: Are you going to be playing any be playing any new songs?

SATE: It will be all the songs from the album so a lot of them will be new to a lot of people. We've been playing a lot of the songs off of the EPs for the last year but now that the songs have been chosen, we're focusing on the ones that are chosen.

AMBY: What do you have planned for 2016? What's coming up next for you?

SATE: The album is coming, yes I'll be doing some shows across Canada. I'll be hitting Edmonton, Regina, Saskatoon, Winnipeg, I think Calgary and there's still dates coming in but I'm looking forward to that. The summertime is going to be filled with festivals and stuff. Fall is filled with festivals and possibly Europe, we're talking about that so it's looking busy. Quite frankly, I don't fucking want to be home, that's what I want. That's my resolution wish for 2016. Don't leave me home for like any longer than a week.

AMBY: Well Europe's the way to do it!

AMBY: Lastly, what would you like to say to your fans who will be reading our interview?

**SATE**: Check me out, like me, send me messages, I like messages. I don't know, I like interaction, come to the shows, buy the music – actually the pledge music is still open. I'll actually close it when the album comes out. That will be sometime early this year. 


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

## SATE at The Legendary Horseshoe Tavern - Concert Pictures



Last Friday night, January 22, I caught Sate's headlining show at The Legendary Horseshoe Tavern. Watch this space for pics from the other great bands that also performed - Xprime, The Honeyrunners ant The Cool Hands. I went a little crazy with the volume of pics from Sate's set but the band is so dynamic and photogenic, I couldn't help myself. Make sure you click on the pics to get into the slide show where their beauty shines briothest.

I became a pretty big Sate fan in a pretty short period of time. I first discovered her music when I was checking out all the acts announced for last year's Toronto Urban Roots Festival. I even put up a feature post on her music and the powerhouse track "The Warrior". From that first listening, I was hooked. The song would end up at number 6 in my list of my favourite songs of 2015.

I got to check out the full power of Sate, which can only truly be experienced at a live show, when the band played The Horseshoe for one of the TURF Club Bonus Series shows, opening for the venerable Fishbone. Everything I hoped I would experience came true. The band delivered power with groove, heaviness with soul and attitude with passion. I knew that I couldn't miss the band's Sunday festival slot on the South Stage. It was just as incredible.

Most recently, Sate participated in the second annual Cover Me Impressed benefit on Boxing Day, playing three amazing cover tunes. More on that later...





Enough with the history, let's get to this show. It was a Friday night at one of my favourite venues, The Legendary Horseshoe Tavern. Three great bands got the crowd warmed up and ready for Sate to hit the stage. Many folks in the crowd had experienced a Sate show before so they knew what to expect. For others, this was their first, but certainly not their last. Sate experience.

She and the band did not disappoint, sounding tight, powerful and excited to play this show. They played the tune "What Did I Do?" second. This tune has a video, embedded below, that was released on Friday. The song starts out with a slow, dirty, blues riff and Sale's forlorn wails, before kicking into gear and hammering out a deep groove. The set continued with "Know My Name", "Try" "Live On Your Love" and "Mama Talk To Me". We then got to the single most familiar to me and several others in the audience, "Warrior". We got to participate in a big, three-part sing-along for this tune. The set closing tune was "Silence". This latter song took us out on a high, high note with the repeating chorus ending. Take a listen to many of these tunes below. These are extremely powerful songs that get the audience just as whipped up as you might expect. Sate is truly one of the best live bands playing today, with a refreshing and invigorating sound and message.

While many bands don't do encores, I really hoped that Sate would return to the stage and treat us to more music. When the audience kept cheering and chanting for more, the band had to come back. Earlier in this post I mentioned that I would have more to say about Sate's appearance at Cover Me Impressed. There was one of her three covers in particular that I was super-impressed with. I thought that It was too good to be a one-off. Sate returned to the stage to play us her version of Black Sabbaths' "War Pigs". It was incredible. I feel like it must be one of those dream songs for a band, and specifically a guitarist, to play on stage. They did an amazing job with this tune and I think it should be a regular part of their set.

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

When they started putting the record together, her and producer Tom McKay cut things down to 18 tracks from over 30 songs. There's another aspect to the campaign, though. Without her mother's influence, there's a good chance SATE would never have existed. Salome Bey retired from performing in 2011 because of dementia. Because the cause is so close to her heart, Talibah is donating 10 per cent of any money raised above the original goal to the Alzheimer Society of Canada.



# oisey: What was recording the EPs like?

Talibah: Leading up to recording the LFF like?

Talibah: Leading up to recording them, writing them, and working with my producer was pretty intense. It was an emotional piece of work. So it was magical to actually get in the room with those guys and have it all come to life, and just the fire and the passion. Everything that went into it was just exactly what I'd heard in my mind. Everyone was really in it and understanding and excited about it. It all came out exactly the way we wanted it.

Can you explain the relationship your EPs have with your totem animals?

Each EP is named for the colours of the totem animals. The Red EP is the robin, and the robin is about springtime and renewal and rebirth, and also letting go. The parther again it is rebirth, and embracing darkness, feminine energy, power. And then the blue is rebirth again. It's a butterfly, so it's transformation, and going into the unknown but having faith in the unknown. It's a lot of letting go and transformation and rebirth in each one of them, but in different ways.

How did you pick these animals?

I vould say they picked me. I kind of listen to what's going on around me, watch what's going on around me. There are animals that kind of pop up in my spirit or I gravitate towards them, and I don't know if I'm the right person to say that they're my spirit animals, but that's what best describes them. These animals just follow me, and there's something about them. Every time spring comes along and I see a robin, I just get really excited and happy, and it makes me kind of go, "what is that about?" Every springtime that happens. When I looked into that it just really resonated with me. Just like the parither and the butterfly. There are other animals, but I didn't want to do like, seven EPs [laughs]. There's the squirrel, and the snake, and the wasp...

What does the song "Warrior" mean to you? There are so many different meanings, but the one that I wrote it from was just to awaken that passion, that dream that you have that you've been leaving on the back burner. This is our time. Each one of us have something that we can offer the world, and to seize the day. But in the recent events of the world, especially what's going on in Baltimore, I think it's about having your voice heard. And burning down systems that hold you back.



hear the voice you want them to hear?

Absolutely. There's a lot more freedom, a lot more focus, determination, perseverance. All of the experiences that I have, that I've learned from, what the album is about. These three women that I've taken their wisdom and become who I am. Life experiences, traveling the world, meeting different people, all off those things create who I am today. And that's really what SATE is: finding my voice and clearly putting it out there.

How do you think your music empowers people?
I think it empowers people to do and be themselves, in all of the beauty and the ugly in the most human form, just to be authentic. To be raw, and roaring, and strong, and having people around to

## Do you think it's weird for Pledgers to have a final say in the track listing of your album? Absolutely not. That's a no-brainer. I'm putting this out for people to listen to and love, so why wouldn't I want them to tell me what they love, what they dig, and just go from there? It's like an inhouse survey... I think it really translates into the world if there are hands-down 500 people that say "I love this song." Why wouldn't I listen to that?

You're donating a portion of the proceeds to the Alzheimer Society of Canada. Can you tell me a bit about your experience with your mother's dementia? It is and it continues to be very challenging, especially since my mother is a singer, a communication. It's really taken hold of her communication. Every once in a while she'll sing. Music is definitely something that awakens her, but it's hard to watch her not be her.

# I've never thought about it that way, how weird it would be to not be able to communicate

I'Ve never moughs about it this way, income to thom you usually would.
I can only imagine what she's going through in her mind. If it's devastating me, it must be tearing her apart. And I mean there aren't a lot of good days, but I have to focus on the fact she's still here.

What do you think the most important thing for people living with dementia to have? A sense of dignity. Patience from their family, friends and loved ones. Understanding. Touch. Human contact, it's hard because for me, sometimes if feet like limbo, watching my mom be in limbo. It really can be any day, where anything can happen. So it's just about savouring the moments right now.

# How has it affected your approach to your music?

It's definitely given me a hunger and desire to just put stuff out, and not be afraid. And to really honour her, because aside from being my mother, she's honestly the reason why I do what I do. So at's honouring her, and keeping her alive.

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

Today, we have the esteemed pleasure of premiering the dynamic diva's latest single, "What Did I Do," a rollicking rock-infused


number that is equally infectious and reflective. Get acquainted after the break, and let us know if you're a fan in the comments section below.


